It is looking to be another fabulous evening celebrating what is great about Maitland and its boutique retailers.



MEET OUR MEMBER ARTIST

Rachel Milne is a figurative oil painter who is rapidly making a name for herself on the Hunter art scene. From the moment I met her and saw her work, I knew I was in the presence of a prodigious talent. Rachel captures everyday vignettes and imbues them through her palette of light and colour with a sense of the exquisite. The work of Wendy Sharpe is recalled, as well as that of Maitland's Shona Trescott. Rachel was trained in an era where the "Young British Artists" reigned supreme but she shunned their conceptual style and opted for a more painterly and traditional approach which is certainly paying off. Also skilled in drawing, her training in drafting is evident in her work. Rachel's preferred subjects are domestic interiors, abandoned and historic architecture and portraiture. Rachel has reflected Newcastle's retail and community history through her series of interiors of the abandoned David Jones building in her latest series, "The Renewal of Mr Jones".

Rachel attained her degree in Fine Art at Cardiff University in Wales and moved to Australia with her husband only 2 years ago. Her

energy is evidenced in the huge body of work she has produced since then. In 2014 she was a finalist in the Kilgour Prize, Calleen and University of Newcastle Acquisitive Prizes. She has held 2 solo exhibitions in Newcastle, participated in a number of group shows and painted many commissions. MRAG was very honoured to host Rachel for her artist residency last year wherein she painted a self-portrait every day for 2 weeks as part of the ABOUT FACE exhibition. During this time Rachel was generous in sharing her knowledge and enthusiasm to hundreds of MRAG visitors. As part of the FREE ART JANUARY program, her lessons in portraiture for all ages were extremely popular and instructive.

Rachel's current major work is a portrait of our very own Cultural Director, Joe Eisenberg, to commemorate his retirement this year. After much encouragement, Rachel is considering entering his portrait in the 2015 Archibald Prize, which the MRAG members will be visiting on Saturday 15 August. Wouldn't it be lovely if this year's winner was home-grown!
