## Yellow House to live again

A POP-IIP installation inspired by the once notorious Yellow House artists' collective will kick off History Week 2013.

Yellow House, which was in Macleav St. Kings Cross. acted as a drop-in centre for leading Australian artists in the early 1970s.

tle," she said, "I can't cook, I can't drive, but I have always loved art and I was very lucky to have a husband who looked after me and I was his woman.


"Every artist is unique and there are some out there I really admire.
