



## A Eulogy for Guy Warren

### Glenn Barkley

This text is adapted from a eulogy delivered at the funeral of Guy Warren on Tuesday 25 June, 2024, published with kind permission from Glenn Barkley.

I want to thank Paul and Joanna. Losing someone with such an enormous almost mythical presence is hard, but losing a dad is harder still.

When I talk about Guy Warren I can't help lapsing into something that is one part memoir and one part myth. Guiding a course between these two things is always difficult and I feel that I am more than a detached observer.

I first met Guy when I was 25 years old. A kid. I knew I wanted a life in art but wasn't sure what that might mean. Lisa Havilah and I had started an art space in Wollongong called 'project'. I distinctly remember seeing Guy for the first time, standing at the top of the steps looking down into the gallery, too anxious to speak to him, and I think he bought some work from us for the University of Wollongong Art Collection.

I started actually working with Guy in 1995. Guy was then a sprightly 74. Thanks to Guy's encouragement and support,

and his great friendship with Gerard Sutton the University Vice Chancellor, my role at the University of Wollongong grew from one, to three, and eventually to 5 days, my title changing from technician to curator along the way.

Guy had a charming way with people – he was probably the only person working at a contemporary university who could get away with calling someone "honey". He would walk away from meetings asking me "who was that?" after they had told him how big an influence Guy had been – but he would wing it beautifully, giving everyone time and a share of his charm.

When I started working at the Museum of Contemporary Art, I took Guy around the galleries - something which I was immensely proud to do knowing how he was a part of my success, although always ready to be pulled up on something usually some grammatical error or spelling mistake, I did tell Guy how much he meant to me as a curator and as a person.

I'm glad I told him that – if you can walk away today and think about the people like that in your life let them know. You don't know when the opportunity will come again.

He took a chance on me and maybe he could see some potential. If he hadn't supported me those years I worked with him in Wollongong, chances are I wouldn't have become a curator or even an artist now – maybe that was what I desired even if I didn't know that. Perhaps Guy knew it?

I was blessed to have the guidance of someone who didn't really care about art world hierarchies – someone who had had such a long career in the art world that he felt free and comfortable enough to say and believe in whatever he wanted.

He was an admirer of craft – then a kind of taboo subject - I think thanks to Joy Warren and her work and advocacy for craft. He, and they, saw the worlds of art and craft co-existing in a way that I too find desirable.

Artists make the worst kind of curators if you are worried about conservation. I distinctly remember going to see a Tony Tuckson show in a public museum and having to stop Guy tapping the paintings with the back of his hand.

But you know you learn as much from the tips of your fingers when you look at art as you do with your eyes or your brain. Guy was, I think, a real believer in that and I know that I am. You can learn a lot from tapping a painting inappropriately with the back of your hand. You can even convince yourself that its real.

I think Guy's legacy as an artist will take longer to become apparent. His was such a big life that it is hard right now to see it with any clarity.

Guy's practice over the decades has been marked by its insistence of returning to the landscape. It was a never ending subject that he constantly renewed and the motif of water and the river, its constant pulsing surges, move continuously through his work.

I have a feeling Guy's work is about immersion rather than accuracy, a general mood rather than anything specific. It is only through this kind of immersion that a tree-fern can transform into a figure and a patch of bush can be turned into a quick whiplash shorthand of marks generated from the wrist and eye. When you carry that landscape in your head it merges with all the other images you carry too and what emerges, if you let it, is something biographical and unique.

In 1939, Guy, his brother and two friends journeyed down the Shoalhaven River in a canoe. The Shoalhaven River was a place to which he always returned. In Guy's work there is a constant reference to the mercurial qualities of water – always changing, reflecting and shimmering, sometimes darkly opaque and steely; at others translucent and gauzelike with endless metaphorical potential.

The Greek Philosopher Heraclites proposed, 'Ever-newer waters flow on those who step into the same rivers'. It's a reminder that life, human life, is in constant change. But in the deep time of a river constantly changing we, in comparison, stay the same.


